Spiritual Reflection: Gospels

Now when they had departed, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there till I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." And he rose and took the child and his mother by night, and departed to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod. Spiritual Reflection: Vincentian Meditation

Gracious and loving God, we come together as a Vincentian family with our desire to care for and serve those in need in our community especially those who experience housing challenges... with love, respect, justice and joy.

We gather today on this Formation Day in the spirit of our founders and in a spiritual context to celebrate the beatification of Rosalie Rendu. Sister Rosalie Rendu was beatified on November 9, 2003. The International Rule of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul calls her "the one who undoubtedly can be called our first Spiritual Advisor". Sister Rosalie taught the young Frederic Ozanam and his friends how to interact with, how to serve and how to love the poor. She was the one who showed them how to do home visits and was always there for the fledgling Society. Her charity was inventive. Sister Rosalie's name was a promise of hope. She started a free clinic, pharmacy, orphanage, child-care center, youth club for young workers and a home for the elderly poor. Blessed Rosalie personifies our Vincentian promise to "help in all possible ways". Her accomplishments are remarkable. Blessed Rosalie Rendu helped those in need in creative and inventive ways. May her inspiration guide us as we journey together toward our goal to enhance our understanding of how to better serve those in our community experiencing housing insecurity.

Spiritual Reflection: Reflect

Reflecting on the scene of the Holy Family fleeing to Egypt we can imagine how similar that night may have been to a homeless family's experience today. The Holy Family's story is like the story of many poor homeless families who will seek shelter in our community. This Christmas story illustrates the challenge of those who experience homelessness. Mary and Joseph traveled a long way to Bethlehem. There was no room at the inn in Bethlehem for them, and they were forced to find shelter in a stable for Mary to give birth to Jesus. The Holy Family knew poverty and homelessness.

Jesus grew in his ministry and travelled from community to community preaching and healing. Jesus left his paternal home and gave up all security in order to proclaim the Kingdom of God and to reach those on the margins. Pope Francis refers to this as "the absolute poverty of Jesus." (Angelus, June 30, 2019.) Jesus could identify with the homeless in His itinerant ministry. In Matthew's gospel, Jesus states that even animals have a place to call home, but he had nowhere to lay his head. He stayed in the homes of whoever would welcome Him and sometimes outside. Jesus became homeless as he moved among his people, identifying with them. In a sense his people were homeless too.

Spiritual Reflection: Reflect

The familiar bronze sculpture of the "Homeless Jesus" depicts Jesus as a homeless person, sleeping on a park bench. The statue has been described as a "visual translation" of the gospel passage from Matthew which Jesus tells his disciples and us as well, "as you did it to one of the least of my brothers, you did it to me." The designer of the sculpture intended for it to "challenge people."

Caring for the homeless is fundamental for us, an integral part of who we are as believers. Catholic Social Teaching principles show the way to a more just and truly human housing system. The Church's teachings remind us that housing is not a valueless system but a core part of what it means to live a dignified human life. Having adequate shelter is a basic human right; a right that the Church affirms as a key part of respecting and recognizing our personhood. Ensuring everyone is able to access a safe, stable and adequate home is one part of working for the common good. This means that social, economic and political structures must be ordered towards making home ownership or rental equitable for all.

Spiritual Reflection: Pause and Reflect

In what ways can the life of Jesus and the experiences of the Holy Family help us to understanding our neighbours in need living with housing challenges?

How do you see the spirit of Blessed Rosalie alive today?

Let us pray

O God, as we recall the life and virtues of Blessed Rosalie grant that we may continue her work of bringing good news and hope to those in need. We ask this in Jesus' name.

HOUSING CHAMPIONS



"Understand that every individual or family facing housing instability is unique and faces unique challenges. Commit to building a closer relationship with persons in need by actively listening to them and learning about their housing concerns."

"Familiarize yourself with at least one government, legal, social or medical support program that relates to housing."

"Familiarize yourself with housing issues by listening to what persons in need have to say about it, by following relevant stories, and by doing background reading.}

"Think about how you might inform and inspire government and other service providers to create needed services or remove barriers faced by persons in need."

"Take part in petitions, letter writing, and awareness-building campaigns that the National Action Committee, or your Regional, Central and Particular councils will issue throughout the campaign."



"Create a solution in partnership with persons in need, your conferences, your Particular council, and outside organizations. Partnership avoids overlap and helps us get more done: small groups working together can do great things!"

"Join a local coalition of Catholic or faith-based helping agencies, or a local coalition working on housing or homelessness. Work together with them to determine how you can best fill the gaps."
